## OGI 2020 5 A-Side Football Tournament

After consulting with the teams, and in commemoration of the first OGI games , the OGIC has decided to expand next years OGI 5 A-Side Football Tournament from the current 9-10 year olds to 9-16 year olds.

For the time being this is only a temporary expansion and a review of the decision will be made after next years OGI. The behaviour of players, managers, parents and spectators, the impact it has on our timetable and whether it leads to an overall increase in competitor numbers, will be factors which the OGIC takes into account when deciding on whether to make it a permanent part of future games.

Each OGI team will be allowed to enter up to two teams per age group and up to two girls will be allowed to compete in the Boys A/B teams, providing that there are not have enough boys registered in that age group to field an all boys team. Girls will not be allowed to compete in the older age groups.

The format of the tournament and on which day it will be staged has yet to be decided and will be taken in consultation with the team managers but subject to our operational requirements.

# A Brief History

Part 2. The St. Peter's years 1980-1984

The inaugural games held at Barnet Copthall Stadium in 1980 saw 21 teams and around 500 competitors from across the UK taking part and as well as the usual athletics, swimming and netball events which we see now, they also had 11 a-side football, 7 a-side rugby, weightlifting, judo and boxing.

For most of the teams it was just case of turning up to compete with very little thought being given to training or track suits. One team however, Scotland, came fully prepared with all their competitors kitted out in matching track suits, courtesy of their sponsorship deal with White Horse Whisky. They would go on to be crowned the first OGI champions, making many friends and setting the benchmark which the rest would eventually follow.

Scotland had wanted the second games to be held in Glasgow but it was decided that this would be impractical, given that the majority of teams were based in the south of England. Unfortunately, as a result of this decision, they decided not to defend their title in 1982 and were never to be seen again.

1982 saw boxing and judo dropped and the games held at the West London Stadium, near Shepherd's Bush. While the number of teams taking part had decreased, the number of competitors registered had gone up to almost 800. Some teams had also started pre OGI training, while almost all of them now wore team tracksuits. The games would be remembered for two things; firstly the weather, it rained almost incessantly for the three days and secondly the winners Arrotini with around only 40 competitors, hold the record as the smallest team to have ever won OGI.

For 1984 the games returned to Copthall Stadium, the Sportsmanship trophy was introduced and the number of registered competitors reached almost 1000, a figure which would never be surpassed. By now, pre games training and track suits was the norm for the teams and after a hard fought 3 days, Finchley would be crowned champions, the first of many titles for them and Hoddesdon winning the Sportsmanship Trophy. It was also the last year that weightlifting, rugby and 11 a-side football would appear in OGI. The biggest change however, was that these would be the last games to be organised and run solely by the St. Peter's Italian Catholic Youth Club Committee.

some are aware, it became clear to us late last year, that because of an extension to next years rugby season and the redevelopment of the old stand, we may not have the use of Allianz Park for 2020.

So we started to look for a new stadium, a task which has proven to be much harder than we originally anticipated. New River Stadium no longer has the facilities for the throwing events, while Lee Valley in Edmonton and Donkey Lane in Enfield would be ideal if only they had larger stands. And our repeated enquiries to both Crystal Palace and Mile End have gone unanswered.



Fortunately our friends at the MGF suggested that we try the Woodside Stadium near Watford and while it is still too early to confirm that this will be our next venue, the stadium does have an all weather track with full field event facilities, a pool, photo-finishing, nearby football pitches, parking for 200 cars, a 700 seater stand, is just off the M25 and most importantly of all, available for hire on the dates we require.
